It also includes information about updating your outbreak management plan and what to do when an individual in your setting tests positive for Covid-19. From 16 August, children under the age of 18 years old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact The special schools and other specialist settings guidance has been updated to confirm that over the summer, staff and secondary pupils should continue to test regularly if they are attending settings that remain open. Advice has also been confirmed for testing in the autumn term.

	Apprenticeships <u>guidance</u> has been updated to reflect the change in the return to the workplace which will apply to apprenticeships as part of step 4 of the roadmap. This includes updated links and references to the redundancy support service, ending of flexibility permitting end-point assessment prior to functional skills qualification achievement, and an extension of the temporary policy on suspending the requirement for Level 2 apprentices to attempt Level 2 functional skills assessment
