Uniform

We are extremely proud of our uniform and the pupils look very smart. We have a uniform to ensure that all pupils are equal and so there cannot be any cliques or bullying related to clothing (such as, 'You need to have the latest Nike bag to be in our group'). Please note that our policy regarding pupils not in uniform is that they will be taught away from their peers. This is something that will be strictly reinforced in the new term. This term, we have had an increasing number of children wearing incorrect shoes to school. School shoes must be: plain, black leather-style lace-up or slip-on formal shoes. Black laces only. No logos or embellishment. No trainers, plimsolls, canvas shoes, open-toe shoes, sandals, boots, high heels, or wedges. School Lunch

The cost of a meal will continue to be £2.30 for the remainder of the academic year, to July 2019. The Spring term is 12 weeks long. The cost of meals for the Spring term is therefore £135.70. Please ensure you top up your child's account before the start of term. If your circumstances change and you think you may be eligible for free school meals, please contact us and we will be able to help you apply.

We have made some improvements to the menu during the term, to enable us to provide the meals that the majority of children enjoy the most. This has included more hot puddings. The weekly menu can be seen on the school website.

Breakfast Club

Our breakfast club runs from 7.30 to 8.15am for those who need to be in school early. We offer breakfast biscuits and fruit as well as the chance to chat with friends and play games. We have been able to secure some funding from the Kellogg's Breakfast Club Grants Programme and we are therefore delighted to be able to continue to provide the club at no charge. We hope that more children will take advantage of the club in the cold and wet mornings of winter.







Spanish and Design and Technology

In both Spanish and Design & Technology we have been learning about The Mexican Day of the Dead. Design & Technology, taught once per week at Saracens High School, is a subject where we are working on a felt toy. On November 2nd, it was Mexican Day of the Dead, therefore, we planned, designed and made a felt toy to represent this. First, we drew out two initial design ideas before designing our final design. Then, we started sewing on all the facial features using different techniques such as an applique, running stitch, overstitch and blanket stitch. After that, we stuffed and closed the toy up. By the end, we had a squishy Mexican Day of the Dead felt toy! I have loved this project in DT as it's been loads of fun learning about stitching techniques and equipment!

English

This term, during English lessons at Saracens High School, Year 7 pupils have: studied autobiographies and biographies; learnt to read actively; been making inferences whilst writing PEE paragraphs; and they have also looked at advertisements.

At the very beginning of the year, we looked at how to read actively. Active reading is about being more actively involved with books, when reading them! We focused on strategies to help us read actively, such as: highlighting texts; looking up words we do not understand; and summarising what we have read.

Additionally, we have been practicing making inferences from texts. An inference is working out what isn't directly said by the writer. Instead, you are looking for the deeper meaning of the extract/text. For example, if an author has written "she went silent," an inference could be that this character is angry or even upset. Indeed, inferences are particularly useful when understanding why writers have written texts and what messages they are trying to communicate to their readers.

Whilst writing our own biographical pieces, we looked at using a variety of sentence types (simple, compound and complex). It is important for our writing to include different sentences to ensure our readers remain interested in the text and to enable us to craft our work better. We even learnt how to use simple and complex sentences for effect!

Currently, are looking at advertisements. It is a very interesting topic and we have gone from analysing adverts to using persuasive language ourselves and creating our own adverts. At the moment, we are creating an advert to attract our pupils and staff to the Saracens' Year 7 Bake Sale, which is being held on Tuesday 18th December at lunchtime. I really cannot wait to see what delicious delights the bake sale will have!

I hope you found this article very interesting about what we have learnt so far at Saracens High School. We have many more topics to come and I really am excited to be studying poetry as well as The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas after the Christmas break!

English - Library

English Reading

With the library finally completed after half-term, we were able to properly launch Accelerated Reader, a software that tests the pupils after they have finished reading a book. The pupils' response was and still is overwhelming with a very high amount of them scoring a 100% on the books they have read. Each time a pupil gets a 100% they receive a certificate signed by Dr Stevens and Miss Chilton to acknowledge their effort and they on top of that receive 10 merits!!!

The library is still in its early days and after the Christmas break we will receive more books to cater to the demand and we will also get a brand new state of the art library system with a bar-code reader!


