Dear Parents and Carers,

We have had a wonderful and busy first half-term at Saracens High School. It seems a long time ago that we had Sarah and Sean, the two Saracens players, handing out the pupils' House ties while BBC Radio 4, BBC London, and The Daily Telegraph, among others were reporting our opening. There is so much to celebrate from the last six weeks.



My highlights have been seeing how the pupils have risen to the challenges of the staff, particularly how they have accepted the notion of making mistakes and attempting to climb out of the learning pit. I have enjoyed watching staff create new opportunities for pupils in lessons and enrichment activities, the way pupils work together and share responsibilities at family lunch, and my conversations with pupils when we celebrate Hot Chocolate Friday.

During the first couple of weeks focused on getting to know the pupils as individuals and then we progressed to targeting challenge activities, making sure that every individual is stretched and supported appropriately in each lesson.

We have hosted a lot of visitors during the halfterm, including our friends from Saracens, Headteachers from other secondary and primary schools, members of the local community, and colleagues from the local authority. Everyone has been impressed with how smart the pupils look, how polite and kind they are, and how articulate and engaging they are in conversation. We also had a lot of visitors for the open evening and open mornings, when we think we had around 600 people come to see what we do and hear about our vision.

Our shared values are discipline, hard work, honesty, and humility. These were created by one of the former Saracens Rugby coaches, who was thinking about the qualities that successful people tend to have. By joining the Saracens organisation, we are committing to living those values. Pupils have been encouraged to think about what that means in their daily lives, both in school and at home. ### **Attendance**

100%

Congratulations to the 73 children who have 100% attendance so far this year.

Do you know that missing just one and a half days in a half term means that a pupil can only achieve 95% attendance for that period?

A number of pupils suffered from the stomach bug that was going around and that cost them a couple of days in school. It is not a problem as long as they come to school every day for the rest of the academic year.

Every year there is a statistically significant relationship between pupils' attendance and punctuality, and examination outcomes. When pupils miss lessons it is often difficult to catch up with all the information that has been missed, so we always try to encourage those who feel a little unwell to stay in class. This is important because there may be times when they are too ill to come to school and we need to limit the overall impact of not being in lessons. Our target for every pupil is to achieve an attendance of at least 97%, which is no more than 6 days off during the whole school year.

#### Uniform

We have received a lot of positive comments about the uniform and how pupils wear it with pride. As we enter the colder part of the year, please remember that coats need to be plain black with no brands or logos. # **Our History Month 2018**

On Monday 15 October the whole of Saracens High School set off on our first school trip. As part of our celebrations of Our History Month, we went to the local RAF Museum.

Our day included a workshop on the local history of the area and aviation.

We had the opportunity to try on real uniforms worn by pilots who flew from the airstrip that used to be located where our school is now.



We also spent time looking around the other hangars at the different exhibitions they had.

One area that many pupils were fascinated by was the drone simulators, which gave them all a chance to take on a mission.





In groups we investigated historical sources from a range of eras to discover how the area has changed over time and how aviation has influenced those changes.

We then presented our findings back to our group, with everyone having the chance to contribute.



The RAF museum trip was absolutely fantastic because there were lots of interesting things to see such as airplanes, helicopters, games, costumes and other cool things to see. My favourite part was the big hall with all types of aircraft.

# **Mobile Phones – Important Update**

Our policy on phones is that pupils should not bring them to school unless there are special circumstances or reasons for your child to have one. We have had phone thefts from adult members of our community very close to the school, including during open evening by someone who came on to the school site to steal from a parent. As the days get shorter and streets and alleyways get darker we are concerned that our pupils could become victims of crime. The vast majority of children currently bringing phones to school could finish the school day and go home to pick up their phones before going out. Pupils may think that our policy is inconvenient, but their safety must be our priority. Some pupils think having a phone makes them safe in case there is an emergency, but according to our Police Safer Schools officer, PC Thomas, they are much more at risk by having it.

From half-term we are asking parents and carers who would like their child to bring a phone to school to complete a form, explaining the need for a phone to be brought in. To balance the risk, this must be a significant reason for the pupil to need the phone (such as picking up siblings, etc). We ask that in all other cases, the phone is left at home

### **Cashless School**

A big thank you to parents and carers for using our Arbor online payments system, to pay for dinners and school trips. This means that we are (almost) a cashless school, which helps to keep our administrative costs down and to focus our resources on teaching and learning. 

## **eSafety**

#### **Fortnite**

We know that many of our pupils are starting to play the game Fortnite.

As with most online activities there are some risks that young people often aren't aware of, and they need adults to help them to remain safe.

Fortnite has a PEGI rating of 12, due to the: 'frequent scenes of mild violence. It is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age'.

As Fortnite is an online game you will play against players of different ages from across the world. You cannot choose who you play against, and players may be exposed to swearing and offensive language from strangers, either through audio or on-screen text chat.

The UK Safer Internet Centre suggests that family members:

- Have an open and honest conversation with young players
- Play with them
- Know how to make a report
- See what other people think of Fortnite

#### **Social Media**

Young people need to be 13 years old before they can have social media accounts on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and Snapchat. If you decide that your child should have an account when they turn 13, please monitor the account regularly and research safety for parents to stay up to date with the latest risks.
