# A message from the Principal

My last newsletter entry started with 'what a unique term this has been' - little did I know that we were about to have another lockdown and an even more 'unique' term. On reflection, it was a difficult time, but a positive time. Thanks to the Worshipful Company of Arbitrators, The Priory Foundation, and the Department for Education, we were able to loan out well over 200 chromebooks, which enabled us to deliver the live online lessons that were a vast improvement on last summer's Google Classroom arrangement.

We had over 40 children in school most days, which was certainly a unique experience for them. The table tennis tables were constantly left up, and many children played daily and quickly became very good. A number of the staff learnt how to lead covid testing as we became a testing centre for staff and pupils, and then we had to quickly adapt and prepare to return to school a little quicker than anticipated.

For pupils and families there were significant challenges to learning at home, particularly to the routine of the day, but with your help, we quickly went from 75% attendance in live lessons to 96%+ for most periods. Consequently, pupils made much more academic progress than during the summer. Our early assessments have suggested that on average, the children made almost as much progress from the live online lessons as we would expect from face-to-face lessons.

Coming back into school has been wonderful. The pupils returned looking smart and had the correct equipment. Thank you for your support with that - we know that some children have

grown a lot and there have been challenges with shopping. The vast majority of children have been keen and eager to learn, and have engaged well with staff in identifying and closing any gaps in knowledge that opened during the break. We know that during the first lockdown reading ages stalled, and I would ask that you continue to support your children with their reading over the coming weeks and months.

We had more good news this term when Mrs Anwar's baby daughter arrived a few weeks early. After Easter we will welcome Mr Morraies, who is our new Computer Science teacher, who will cover for Mrs Anwar's absence and then remain with us as the team expands when she returns next year.

Also in the summer term we will welcome Miss Clark, who is our new PE teacher, and at half-term we will be joined by Mr Tester, our new Subject Lead for Science, who will take over from Ms Latif.

We have again been fortunate to attract some exceptional members of the teaching staff for next September and we will begin our recruitment process for non-teaching staff after Easter. We are keen to recruit from the local community, so please do look out for the adverts and pass them on to people you know who might be interested.

I hope you have a safe and enjoyable Easter break and we look forward to seeing pupils again on Monday 19 April.




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



### Drama

In Year 7 pupils have been developing their understanding of the Shakespearean play Romeo and Juliet. They have focussed on key plot moments as well as important themes such as tragedy and arranged marriage. Pupils have also had the opportunity to develop their oracy skills through performing a soliloquy, which is a lot harder than it sounds! Pupils not only had to think about their vocal skills but also how they move around the stage and use their physical skills. It was hard work which many did incredibly well in.

In Year 8 pupils have been developing their understanding of how to create a piece of theatre from scratch. Pupils used the theme of the Seven Deadly Sins taken from Chaucer's The Canterbury Tales to devise an imaginative non-naturalistic piece of theatre. Non-naturalism was a difficult concept for many to understand at first but they soon got into it creating rather thought provoking, abstract pieces based on Gluttony.

In Year 9 pupils have been working hard to learn their lines and blocking for play 'Crusaders' by Frances Poet for the National Theatre Connections project. This has been a particularly challenging time for the GCSE Drama pupils as many of our rehearsals took place on Zoom during the lockdown. Pupilshave worked incredibly hard to learn the blocking, the sub context of the lines and the tone of voice required. The play is coming together really well and will be performed in school before the Easter holidays. The recording of Crusaders will then be streamed to their parents and friends during the Arts Depot Connections Festival after the Easter holidays.

Help save the world, For you, for them, for us Make your voices heard, Reduce pollution we must.


Help save the world, Or do you want to have no future? To guarantee nature is preserved, Is up to us to nurture.

So one last time, help save the world, Don't let more deaths be in vain, Let the Earth continue to twirl, And don't leave lungs in pain.





# **History**

This half term in History, Year 8 have been learning about the Civil Rights Movement to assess the significance of individuals and events that aided the progress of civil rights in the USA. Pupils have been learning about individuals such as Emmett Till and events such as the Montgomery Bus Boycott. They have used living graphs to plot the significance of these events, using the work of historian Christine Counsell to guide them. It has been a challenging topic, and one which has resonated with Year 8, as they have made links to more recent protests and campaigns for equality in the process.



# **Futures Programme - Exploring careers**

At Saracens High School we understand that supporting our pupils in making well-informed choices about subjects and career paths can lead them to have a more optimistic outlook on life. It can also help them develop a sense of purpose and a greater level of contribution to their families and society.

Due to COVID restrictions, we are unable to invite visitors onsite. However, that hasn't stopped us from providing opportunities for pupils to acquire knowledge about different industries and jobs. Our latest event took place on Tuesday 23 March when all our Year 8 pupils were able to connect remotely with five professionals from different industries to explore learn more about their jobs.
