PLAN

What is important in your answer.

Don't spend too long planning

Jot down your main ideas

Work out your structure (how many paragraphs,

intro, conclusion)

Link by topic or themes





Structure

Use paragraphs to organise your points and link ideas.

Link your paragraphs using phrases such as- 'on the other hand' and 'in addition'.

Short introduction End with a summary/ conclusion that clearly reminds the reader of your main argument. Despite... Ultimately...

Write clearly Don't make sentences too long or complicated Check your argument is easy to understand Use specific exams and precise quotes





Make sure you write properly

Avoid informal

Avoid informal words (Romeo's mate Mercutio)

Steer clear of slang (the poem made me LOL)

Don't use filler words (Pollution is, like, bad)

Explain things clearly using phrases like:

This signifies that...

This highlights...

This suggests...

Furthermore...

These will keep your answers easy to follow.

Link ideas and
points with words
such as:

However
In contrast
Similarly

Alternatively
They will make you

SPAG



Important notes:

Avoid common spelling mistakes (there/ their/ they're)

Use punctuation properly (remember to check!)

Don't change tenses (it's confusing)

Double negatives (avoid!)

Start a new paragraph for a new point (don't just write in 1 block)

Leave time to quickly check your answers (5 mins to fix and silly mistakes)

Charles Dickens: A Christmas Carol

Read the following extract from Chapter 3 of A Christmas Carol and then answer the question that follows.

In this extract, the Ghost of Christmas Present shows Scrooge the Cratchit family's Christmas celebrations.

- Oh, a wonderful pudding! Bob Cratchit said, and calmly too, that he regarded it as the greatest success achieved by Mrs. Cratchit since their marriage. Mrs. Cratchit said that now the weight was off her mind, she would confess she had had her doubts about the quantity of flour.
- 5 Everybody had something to say about it, but nobody said or thought it was at all a small pudding for a large family. It would have been flat heresy to do so. Any Cratchit would have blushed to hint at such a thing. At last the dinner was all done, the cloth was cleared, the hearth swept, and the fire made up. The compound in the jug being tasted, and
- 10 considered perfect, apples and oranges were put upon the table, and a shovel-full of chestruits on the fire. Then all the Cratchit family drew round the hearth, in what Bob Cratchit called a circle, meaning half a one; and at Bob Cratchit's elbow stood the family display of glass. Two tumblers, and a custand-cup without a handle.
- 15 These held the hot stuff from the jug, however, as well as golden goblets would have done; and Bob served it out with beaming looks, while the chestnuts on the fire sputtered and cracked noisily. Then Bob proposed: "A Merry Christmas to us all, my dears. God bless us!" Which all the family re-echoed.
- 20 "God bless us every one?" said Tiny Tim, the last of all. He sat very close to his father's side upon his little stool. Bob held his withered little hand in his, as if he loved the child, and wished to keep him by his side, and dreaded that he might be taken from him.
